

I first met James when he was three years old, He was nonverbal and was diagnosed as having autism. So I suggested to James' mother that we put him on a horse to see if maybe it would help.

I knew that horses helping people with autism is a thing. When my grandson was 18 months old, he had stopped talking. I put him on a horse and he started singing and, later that night, he was practicing words in his crib.

A friend has a grandson with autism, and he is a friend of Rupert Issacson, father of an autistic son and author of "Horseboy." I met Rupert last fall at the Warwick Schiller Podcast Summit, and he explained how the rhythmic movement of the pelvis when riding a horse releases oxytocin, a hormone responsible for prosocial behaviors including trust, empathy, gazing, processing bonding cues and positive communication.

The day James first came to the ranch, he literally hit the ground running...and shrieking and flailing, his mom hot on his heels. He ran here and there, and eventually ended up running down the alleyway where my horses are. He stopped directly in front of Destiny's paddock and looked up at her as if to say "YOU!" She looked down as if she had been waiting for him. It was a match made in heaven!

I outfitted her with a soft fluffy bareback pad and mom lifted him up to Destiny's back. He became very still and quiet, and with his mom at his side, making sure he did not fall off, we proceeded to walk our mile loop. Past the pond to the fork in the road, where I asked James which way he wanted to go. I told him he could point, and he did! He said his first two words while astride the magical unicorn named Destiny, I had said "Happy Birthday" to a friend driving by, and James very quietly said "Happy Birthday!" His mom and I couldn't believe it!! We felt like we had witnessed a

The next week two more words were uttered. During that second ride James was able to convey that he wanted to get down at the pond. He was drawn to the water and the ducks. He began to have a tantrum (which I understand were mighty powerful things), and I asked him if he wanted to get back up on Destiny. He lifted up his arms, I put him back up and his thankful and astonished mother stated that they had never been able to divert a tantrum before!

James continued to improve his speech and the tantrums all but ceased. One day he said "Thank you, Destiny!"

When my bevy of grandkids were visiting, they took James under their wings, he became absorbed into the midst of the five of them. They adored him and made him part of everything they did. That was his first experience interacting with other kids, and he was in the hands of

By the time he saw his doctor for his 4 year old visit, he was practically testing in the normal range and he started a regular TK class that fall.

Jane has a BA in Psychology, and taught K-8 art in local schools for 20 years. She has two adult children, and seven grandkids. An avowed horse lover, she owns three gentle Arabian horses and a donkey, and has been horsing pretty much her whole life. She is a Certified Masterson Method bodyworker, and has been known to work with some pretty troubled horses (and sometimes their humans).

James is now five. He has been spending about an hour a week with my horses and me at the ranch. Indy, my big bay gelding, is his current favorite. He helps clean the stall, unlocks the tack room, and picks feet out. He can tell stories, has a great sense of humor, and is very interested in learning about and observing nature. He loves cars, and motorcycles-pretty much anything with wheels. And he is fearless, absolutely fearless around the horses. He loves them all.

I am sharing this story with you in hopes that it will lead to awareness of the power of horses to heal and help those who are neuro-atypical to get along better in the world—especially to get them on and around horses and into nature, and to do it early. As early as possible. In all the studies I could find, kids weren't introduced to therapeutic riding therapy until around age seven, and I think a window of opportunity is being missed.

With all of our wonderful horses out there, we could help to improve the quality of life for some kids and their families, and give them brighter futures! We have the power. Does James still have autism you might wonder. Well, I would say he is still on the spectrum and will likely always be, but he can communicate with and understand others in the world so much better than he could have had he not been introduced to horses. He is playing soccer, taking swimming lessons, and likes to skateboard with his dad. He is living a normal life, which is huge for his family.





It's easy to see that Destiny (the Magic Unicorn) shares a special bond with her young friend, James. Indy also loves it when James visits, especially when he gives him a kiss (aw...)!

What a Ride!

All three horses, beautifully clean on Friday night, and Sarah after the ride and several happy, tired rolls in the dirt.





On May 22, some friends and I participated in the Kristina Chesterman Memorial Endurance Ride in Magalia, California. My mare, Sarah, my dog, Rory, and I arrived at noon on Thursday to find out we had our choice of primo camp sites and horse pens under beautiful shade trees. The grounds at the Meadowbrook Ranch where we were staged were rustic and absolutely beautiful. We met a new friend camped nearby. Great way to spend the evening with snacks, adult beverages, and swapped stories about our lives—mostly our horse adventures in and out of endurance riding.

Rory and I explored the ranch, from the rustic red barn to the lake full of Canada geese and plenty of ducks. When my dear friend Jen arrived on Friday with her boyfriend Steve, I was already convinced it was the best horse camping trip ever, and the ride starting early Saturday morning was just gravy.

After vetting the horses in Friday afternoon, Sarah and I, Jen with her little QH, Lucia, and Steve with tall, beautiful Ghost were ready. Steve was entered for the 50-mile ride, and Jen and I were to ride the 35-mile ride. At 7:00 am, we 35-milers set off on one of the most beautiful, well-run rides I've ever been in. Rushing creeks, shady trails, snow-capped mountains, and even a touch of snow at the top of the trail that our two beautiful mares gratefully stood in for a few minutes.

This ride was a bit unique in that at the 20-mile vet check we were allowed, if our horses were certified good-to-go, to elevate to the 50-mile distance. They were stellar, so off we went to finish 30 more miles with a huge steep hill near the end.

I'm not going into a lot of detail on how I completely disregarded every thing I know about completing a 50. I'll just say I pretty much broke every rule I've ever set for myself to complete a 50 or 50 + ride. At the last 10-mile check, the vets were quite literally cheering us on. Like you girls better haul ass or you won't make the

finish line in time. We gulped water, let our horses eat and drink their fill, and the vets cleared us to go after our 30-minute hold.

After we got past the two turns on paved roads, we cantered down mostly great footing under the trees, slowing only for any rocky spots. At the end, we missed a turn and cantered into the finish line from the wrong direction, almost getting our selves disqualified.

The vets and ride management decided that we deserved our completions based on the mileage we actually did ride and the excellent condition of our horses. They pulsed down perfectly and passed their final vet checks in great shape.

Lest someone reading this is scowling and passing judgement on how we may have abused our horses, I'm proud to share a few facts. The horses started in great condition. You don't just wake up one morning and decide to do this. Second, both Jen and I are very caring and diligent riders. These two mares are not spring chickens. Lucia is an 18-yr-old Quarter Horse and Sarah is a 19-year- old Shagya Arab. Had I strategized the ride as I could have and should have, we would have made the ride pretty easily. Instead we had to depend on our trusty steeds to get us through. Not once did we ever have to ask either horse to speed up or pick up the canter. Both horses willingly hauled ass to the finish line in beautiful shape as attested to by their good vet scores.

I, on the other hand, was pretty beat up at the end. But never say die, I slept soundly in my wonderful cabover camper with Rory. And Sarah spent a good night after plenty of all-you-can-eat grub in a very nice pen nearby.

The next morning, Steve made us all a wonderful breakfast. After saying good by to JayaMae, our wonderful ride manager, we packed up and drove home. So I check another successful 50-mile ride off my list. First one I've done on Sarah, and first 50 I've done since 2011.


